The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) now has policy calling upon pediatricians to become informed about adoption, to share their knowledge with adoptive families, and to advise and assist the families with various challenges related to adoption. - children's developmental understanding of adoption
- racial and cultural differences
- kinship adoption issues
- communication with children about adoption

Help Your Kids Kick the TV Habit!

A new longitudinal study examining TV habits from birth to adulthood confirms previously established correlations between excessive childhood TV watching, and such health risks as smoking, obesity and high cholesterol. (The Lancet, 7-16-04). The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends children's TV time be limited to NO MORE THAN 2 hours a day.


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Book Review: *The Family of Adoption*, by Joyce Maguire Pavao Review by Nina Yates, ORPARC volunteer



So far, Joyce Maguire Pavao's book, *The Family of Adoption*, is the best book on this subject that I have read. As an adopted daughter from a family which is no where near as eager to discuss adoption as openly as I like to, I am always searching for a book that could break the ice without being too psychological or *out there*. This just might be that book. Pavao introduces new ideas, which may be difficult to consider for the first time, with compassion and clarity.

In the preface, Pavao shares her own story as an adoptee and acknowledges her bias. She is most interested in the best interests of the adopted child, not just at the moment when the child leaves one family for another, but for that person's entire lifetime. The first two chapters discuss the importance of understanding all the parents, birth and adoptive. As a family-systems thinker, Pavao talks about how important it is to see the parents' needs and concerns clearly since their impact on the adoptee is so powerful. The next chapter explores the experience of the adopted child and demonstrates that there are predictable and understandable developmental stages for all adopted people. Pavao shows us why adoptive parents must come to understand these stages as normal – though challenging – for adoptees. The epilogue details recommendations made in response to President Clinton's *Adoption 2002*, an initiative to move America's children out of foster care and into permanent homes. Pavao shares her hopes for a new consciousness about adoption and its impact on our nation in the new millennium.

Nip Bullying in the Bud



Bullying – repeated verbal, physical, or emotional harassment – is not merely an unavoidable childhood rite of passage. Bullying is harmful to both its victim and its perpetrator. According to recent research, “there is good reason to be concerned about kids who are bullied, particularly those who are picked on consistently.”¹ Studies show bullied kids have an increased risk of depression, anxiety, low self-esteem, migraine headaches, and suicidal thoughts. And “bullies” do not fare much better, with higher likelihood of antisocial or violent behavior. In fact, both groups are at risk for criminal justice involvement or mental health issues.

Don't Ignore Bullying. Take immediate action if your child is being harassed, or is reported for bullying behavior. Solicit the collaboration of teachers, school counselors, and your family support system.

Take preventative action. Ask your school to undertake a bullying prevention program.






