State of Oregon Budget Cuts Affecting ORPARC

In April 2011, ORPARC received notice of potential program elimination due to statewide budget cuts. Through the compelling efforts and hard work of many, we are very thankful to report that we will continue to provide services, although with a 30% reduction to our budget. The following services will remain, some at a reduced frequency:

- ◆ Information, Assistance, Referral to Services
- ◆ In-Depth Consultation, Advocacy and Support by phone
- ◆ Parent Education and Trainings (reduced to 6-8 a year)
- ◆ Lending Library (replacement/acquisitions on hold)
- ◆ Support Groups (consultation by phone)
- ◆ Website and Seasonal Newsletter
- ◆ Reduced Bi-lingual Services
- ◆ Outreach by mail and phone

We are grateful to all of you who spoke out on behalf of continuing services for post adoptive families, and who supported ORPARC through this time. We hope that in the future our services will be fully restored, and we look forward to assisting Oregon's state adoptive and guardianship families for many years to come.

Calling All Therapists!

Certificate Program: Adoption & Foster Family Therapy

Oregon DHS, ORPARC, and PSU's Graduate Schools of Social Work & Education have created the Oregon Certificate Program in Adoption and Foster Family Therapy. The Certificate Program provides 100 hours of advanced education and training for licensed mental health professionals (at the Master's level and above) in the specialized theories and practices for addressing the needs of adopted children who have histories of abuse and neglect. In particular, mental health professionals learn how to identify and build on family strengths, and coach adoptive and foster families in alternative approaches, expectations and interactive strategies for helping their children.

This program increases the number of accessible and affordable mental health professionals for adopted/foster children and their families. A directory of professionals who have completed this training certificate is available on the ORPARC website.

Accessing OHP services for your child or young adult

On August 29th, the state launched “OR-KIDS,” Oregon’s new Statewide Automated Child Welfare Information System, which contains information for clients served under DHS-Children, Adults and Families (CAF) Division. Under the new system, children keep their biological case Oregon Health Plan (OHP) Recipient ID (also known as Prime Number) up to the point of adoption finalization. At the point the adoption finalization case is opened a new prime number is assigned. This means your child will receive a new Medical Care ID and coverage notice showing the current OHP managed care enrollments for the new prime number. CAF is working to ensure continuous coverage and enrollments for children with new prime numbers. Should your family encounter any difficulty accessing covered OHP services, please do not hesitate to contact the resources at the end of this article.

Private Health Insurance

Under your child’s adoption assistance agreement, if you requested OHP coverage, you are not obligated to provide private health insurance. However, with private health insurance there is the potential for a broader array of coverage than the OHP may provide alone. If you have a change, addition, or loss of private insurance for your child, please notify your adoptions assistance coordinator. They will work with you to complete an insurance verification form. Depending on the change, your child may be sent an updated OHP managed care coverage notice and ID card.

Changes to the OHP Prioritized List

The OHP “prioritized list” of covered services is reviewed and often adjusted on October 1st each year. With the global budget crisis, some OHP services covered last year are no longer funded. Healthy Kids Coverage

For children who have “aged out” of adoption or guardianship services, there is an avenue to provide OHP Plus coverage through your child’s 18th year. On or around your child’s 18th birthday the Child Welfare Federal Compliance Unit conducts a continuing medical eligibility review and a new case number is established for continuous coverage up to your child’s 19th birthday. This process is meant to be invisible to parents. As your child nears their 19th birthday, it is vitally important to respond to any requests for new/changed information. At age 19 a youth may not be eligible for the OHP Plus level of coverage. The eligibility determination will include a review for all types of eligibility. Again, please remember to respond to all requests for medical and financial resource information within the given timelines.

Fostering Adoption to Further Student Achievement Act

The Fostering Adoption to Further Student Achievement Act became law as an amendment to the College Cost Reduction and Access Act (Public Law 110-84). This law revised the definition of "independent student" to extend to **youth who were in foster care on or after their 13th birthday, even if they have subsequently been adopted.** On the FAFSA form question number 52 on the application pertains to this. IF you were in foster care ON or AFTER your 13th birthday you would mark YES to this question. Your college may request you to prove this, so you would then need to obtain documentation from the Department of Children and Families, or your adoption decree might be sufficient. Basically, independent student status excuses your parents' income from the equation making your financial aid award greater. 



Film Review: "Aging Out"

This documentary film follows three foster kids, David, Daniella, and Risa, as they prepare to age out of the foster care system. As one prepares for parenthood, another for college, and another settles for a less than salient future, their stories open up a window for us to see how their lives in foster care have affected them and their understanding of emancipation and adulthood. All three featured foster children yearn deeply for independence and for the power to direct their own futures, something that they have had little control over their whole lives. With little or no family support, they all take the plunge. Interviews with David and his original foster parents paint a picture of a disturbed child whose needs outweigh the family's ability to provide, adding to the atmosphere of uncertainty and hopelessness his story reflects. Struggling to make sense of his life and decisions, David's tale leaves a lasting impression. We also see pregnant Daniella grudgingly comply with foster care as she weighs the benefits of independence against the necessity of financial security. As she fights to keep her new family intact, she must make choices and sacrifices that will provide her with the future she has envisioned for them. Described by the director of the film as foster care's "golden girl," Risa's story, the final character, begins full of hope and determination. Goal-oriented and driven, Risa refuses to become a statistic as she gives the fight of her life to find success in a world unfamiliar to many youth in foster care. As she faces unforeseen obstacles and continues to battle the demons of her childhood, hers is a story of extreme highs and gripping lows. This film is an intimate view into the lives of three young adults as they address age-appropriate concerns like education, employment, social standing, family and future, but from the complicated standpoint of foster children preparing to age out.

Brain Imaging Research Study at OHSU—IRB Study # 5239

The Oregon Health Sciences University (OHSU) in Portland is conducting a brain imaging research study. The study is seeking children participants ages 7 and 13 with a diagnosis of high functioning Autism Spectrum Disorder. Participants must be in good health and speak English as their first language. Compensation is available for children and parents participating in the study. Call 503-494-1001 for more information.

What we are studying?

- ♦ We are studying the differences in the brains of children and adolescents with and without Autism. We will use Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) and mood, thinking and behavior assessments to find out about the differences.

If your child participates, what will they be doing?

- ♦ One, two or three visits for a total of about 6-9 hours of time:
 - Visit 1: Parent completes a diagnostic interview. Child completes a play-based diagnostic evaluation.
 - Visit 2: Child will have their mood and behavior assessed and a practice MRI (this MRI is not real).
 - Visit 3: Child will have a 1-hour MRI at the OHSU Advanced Imaging Research Center and an optional saliva sample (this optional sample collection could occur at a separate visit if preferred).

Compensation:

- ♦ Children will receive \$60 total and a color image of their brain.
- ♦ Parents will receive \$80 total.
